1.**ADAMS**, John Quincy. ORATION ON THE LIFE AND CHARACTER OF GILBERT MOTIER DE LAFAYETTE.... \$100.00

The speech delivered by Adams to the House of Representatives on 31st December 1834 "at the bequest of both houses of the Congress of the United States, before them, in the House of Representatives." Lafayette had recently died, and he held an important place in American history. For his esteemed role in the Revolution at the side of Washington he was one of the few foreign friends of America awarded American citizenship in his lifetime. John Quincy Adams knew Lafayette since he was a young boy in the Revolution. Adams is the first child of a president to become president; the first president to be a published poet; and the first president to be photographed. He was certainly one of the most intelligent presidents and one of the greatest humanitarians to hold that office. He is best perhaps best known for two accomplishments outside of his term: the authorship of the Monroe Doctrine as secretary of state and his heroic, successful argument before the Supreme Court to free the Amistad slaves. Still considered to be the most scholarly edition with prefaces and historical and biographical notes by Alexander Chalmers. A handsome set.

3. **ALDRICH,** Henry. ELEMENTAL ARCHITECTURAE CIVILIS. \$950.00 Oxford: D. Prince, and others, 1789. 8vo. Contemporary full-calf. Engraved frontispiece, (x), 54 pages; (iv), Ixvi, 66, pages, 55 engraved plates. First edition. [Harris, 17].

Henry Aldrich (1648-1710) conceived of this work as a six-part study, but only two parts were written by the time of his death. In 1708, only the first part was published in Latin illustrated with twelve plates. This edition, in 1789 was the first edition of both parts, the complete work. It begins with the Latin text and is followed by the first English translation of the work, complete with its own title page. The translation was by Philip Smyth. Thomas Jefferson recommended its purchase by the University of Virginia and a copy was finally donated by the Coolidge family of Boston in 1825 of the second edition (1818). [See O'Neal, 5]. The work explains Vitruvius using plates based on Palladio's *Quattro Libri*. Our copy contains a Subscription List, with two hundred and twenty-eight names. The stipple, engraved frontispiece is by Geoffrey Kneller. Eighteenth-century engraved armorial bookplate of "John Edwards," with his signature dates 1794 on front blank leaf. Light, sporadic foxing throughout, else a nice copy in a sympathetic binding.

The definitive final edition, after its first appearance in London in 1787. One of the most important and widely read of the many writings of the important Revolutionary figure and second president of the United States. The second and third volumes, originally issued later than the first, contain descriptions of the Italian republics of the Middle Ages as well as a lengthy analysis of "the Right Constitution of a Commonwealth." At the time Adams wrote this work he was serving as the first United States ambassador in England. Here he states the principles on which he perceived the United States to be founded. The book was popular and went through numerous editions. Its issuance at the commencement of the Federal Constitutional Convention added to its popularity and resulted in several American reprintings. Gilt decorated spines and gilt decorated banding on boards. Very good.

Edited by Isaac Reed, and his first important work. The *Biographia Dramatica*, a set of biographies and dramatists and a descriptive dictionary of their plays, was an enlargement of David Erskine Baker's *Companion to the Playhouse* (2 volumes, 1764). "Also an alphabetical account of their works, the dates when printed, and occasional observations on their merits. Together with an introductory view of the rise and progress of the British stage." The original work by Baker had been based on Gerard Langbaine's *Account of the English Dramatic Poets*, (1691); Giles Jacob's *Poetical Register*, (1719); Thomas Whincop's *List of all the Dramatic Authors*, printed with his Tragedy of Scanderberg, (1747); and the manuscript of Thomas Coxeter, (1689-1747). Armorial bookplate of the Marquess of Headfort. Slight wear but an attractive set.

An unusual pattern book, the most uncommon of all of Bicknell's publications, in that the sample houses, each shown here with elevation and floor plan, mostly come from other Bicknell pattern books. The specimens include plans for suburban houses, villas, sea-side and camp-ground cottages, homesteads, churches and public buildings. Where someone built a home from the pattern, the owner's name and location are listed. They include homes from Tenafly and Elizabeth, New Jersey, Nyack and Matteawan, New York. There are also several plates of mantles and furniture and elaborate Queen Anne and Arts and Crafts and Aesthetic Movement interiors. With twelve pages of building and furniture related advertisements and index in back. While all editions of Bicknell have the same number of pages, each edition made significant changes in the houses illustrated making each edition important. Very good.

Scarce first edition with only four U.S. copies listed on OCLC. "The poetry of William Cowper expressed a deep sympathy with nature and love for simple rural landscape. Like the writing of Gilpin, it influenced the popular romantic taste for natural scenery at the close of the eighteenth century. Nearly all his important poems were written while living in Weston and nearby Olney in Buckinghamshire. Various images and scenes from his poetry can be traced to the surrounding countryside and, in particular, to the park and grounds of Weston-Underwood, the country home of his friend John Throckmorton, which lay adjacent to his own. The "description of Weston Park" presented in this volume is similar in character to the familiar house guides of the eighteenth century, but written specifically to reflect the interests of the would-be pilgrim moved to visit the haunts and retrace the melancholy steps of the great poet.

The evocative plates which illustrate the text were drawn and engraved by James Storer and John Greig. They include such scenes as the peasant's nest, the rustic bridge, the temple in the wilderness, the shrubbery, etc. Listed in John Harris *A Country House Index*, (1979). This copy has a three page manuscript poem, "To Mary," in which Cowper expresses his deep feelings for Mary Unwin - bound in between pages 16 and 17. Hinges expertly mended. Although several copies are recorded in OCLC in university and museum libraries, no copies are recorded in the American Book Prices Current as being in the trade for more than twenty-five years. A comprehensive Victorian design book "for the use of upholsterers, cabinet-makers, decorators, carvers, gilders, and others," also illustrating early examples of Aesthetic Movement designs. Sympathetically rebacked using the original spine as an overlay. Minor wear to tips of boards, else very good.

An attractive book containing illustrations of a thirteenth-century church. The plates, three tinted lithographs and fourteen zincographs, are by J.K. Colling, who later served as Christian's partner. Ewan Christian (1814-1895) built a number of churches and was also active in restoration. He served as architect to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, the Church Building Society, and the Charity Commissioners. Inscription in ink, occasional foxing and smudging, half-inch tear in margin of plate 12, not affecting illustration, minor edge wear.

Crane one of the best late 19th century English book illustrators and book binders during the Arts & Crafts movement. The original pictorial binding designed by Crane has his monogram. The decorative endpapers are also designed by him, and the text includes twelve full-page illustrations by him as well. Slightly soiled and front hinge cracked, else a very good copy.

One of the earliest architectural studies of Gothic architecture in England from the Anglo-Saxon period to the sixteenth century. His focus is on the ecclesiastical examples. An exceptionally nice uncut copy with front hinge starting but firm.

Rare title with only two copies of this edition recorded on OCLC and only in England. Originally published in 1658, Darling says to the reader: "wherefore at the request of many that have occasion to make use of such kind of measure, I have made it publick with exact tables thereunto belonging, being perswaded that it would be a great help not only to carpenters, but others that make use of measure, especially of such as cannot read..." Darling does not pretend to "great exactness" he caters for the "ignorant," whose needs he evidently supplied so well that his book remained in print for eighty years. There was a copy in America before the Revolution. With twenty wood-engraved text illustrations. Professionally rebacked. Slight marginal waterstain in the final dozen or so leaves (but not heavy). Inscription on front paste down; "John Booker, September 29, 1732."

An uncommon work with only six copies in American libraries listed on OCLC of this first edition. According to the title page it was written "so to methodize and arrange the subject, as to render the practice familiarly intelligible to the uninitiated in a few hours of study." It is divided into two parts. The first part is theory, general principles and definitions. The second part is practical rules and application with chapters on definitions; problems; solids; and summary and additional remarks. The folding plates are by Hullmandel and are numbered I-XIV, and "Continuation of Plate XVI." Neatly respined with new paper label, end-papers, and paste-downs. Some foxing to edges of plates and to the title page, else very good.

Constant de Massoul was an artist's color man who operated a shop on Bond Street in London at the end of the eighteenth century. His treatise was translated from the French but only appears in this English edition of 1797, and is the scarcest of the two works and is now a regularly cited source for information about eighteenth century painter's practice. According to the subtitle "Containing instructions for all the various processes of painting. Together with observations upon the qualities and ingredients of colours." It is a study of the composition of colors and is focused upon the use of colors in painting while Webb's treatise into the beauties of painting...is an essay in connoisseurship, delving into the merits of paintings in general and the paintings of celebrated artists, old and modern, in particular. Webb's book was recommended by Thomas Jefferson to his brother-in-law, Robert Skipwith. Robert Carter of Nomini Hall owned the first edition of Webb's book. The de Massoul is not listed by Janice Schimmelman in her book, A Checklist of European Treatises on Aesthetics available in America through 1815 while Webb is listed with many citations. Early owner's signature on title page. Contemporary binding cracked down spine; edges chipped, else a nice copy.

An untrimmed copy in the original boards. This major country house, rebuilt by architect Henry Flitcroft for the fourth Duke of Bedford is still open to the public. The present guidebook gives a good description including a list of the paintings "with their disposition and size as placed at Woburg Abbey." Includes the list of subscribers. Bookplates. Hinges worn, else a good crisp and untrimmed copy.

23. **DRESSER,** Christopher. MODERN ORNAMENTATION, BEING A SERIES OF DESIGNS FOR PATTERNS OF TEXTILE FABRICS. \$3.200.00

Modern Ornamentation (1886) was Dresser's last book of designs. "This work has been prepared with the hope that it may be of service to manufacturers who are engaged in the production of figured objects, and to architects and designers who have to produce the patterns which manufacturers require." The designs are in adapted and mixed styles and styles of his own invention. "Throughout the book he demonstrates an unequalled virtuosity in eclectic designing," (Durant, *Ornament*). Scarce.

Studies in Design is Dresser's most inventive, original and important compendium of designs. It was published over a three year period and is very uncommon in collectable condition. Christopher Dresser (1834-1904) was born the same year as William Morris. The pair became the two most influential designers of Aesthetic ornamentation for their generation. Dresser began his career working for his mentor, Owen Jones. He shared with Ruskin the use of nature as the basis for design and tried, more than Jones, to codify design itself. His approach to ornament, which emphasized a flattened, stylized image, was especially appealing to American neophytes. Dresser took advantage of this by traveling to America for the Philadelphia Centennial Exposition and created a number of wallpaper designs while in this country. Some of the startling color combinations in *Studies in Design* derive from Dresser's color experiments. He was among the most daring of colorists, as he once said "the sweetest harmonies" in color are often closest to discord." Chromolithographic plates by A. Goater, Nottingham. Cloth cover expertly recased, else a very good copy. Rare thus.

Du Fresnoy's poem on the art of painting, originally written by its author when a young artist in Rome in the middle of the seventeenth century, caught the imagination of several generations of poets and artists in Europe, Italy and Britain. The present translation into English verse was done by William Mason, the friend of the poet Gray and of Horace Walpole, superseded an earlier prose translation by Dryden, and carried particular authority from the fact that Mason replaced notes by the French painter Roger Du Piles which had accompanied previous editions with a new series of notes supplied by Sir Joshua Reynolds. In the present volume it is bound together with a copy of the first edition of Mason's verse drama Caratacus; the action of the drama takes place in a Druid temple on the island of Anglesey, with an appropriately melodramatic plot, but there are effective passages of verse, in part because Mason's text was seen and revised by Gray prior to publication. Du Fresnoy's book became the standard work on the painting of the French Academy. In Janice Schimmelman's A Checklist of European Treatises on Art and Essays on Aesthetics available in America through 1815, she locates thirty-one separate copies, making this one of the most widely disseminated art books in early America of which only seven were translated by William Mason. In Virginia copies of Du Fresnoy's work were in the libraries of William Byrd of Westover and of Robert Carter of Nomini Hall. Rebacked using the original spine as an overlay, still a nice copy.

While Moisy's plates delineating Paris's fountains were issued separately, this is the rare first edition of the plates with Duval's excellent text. There are no copies cited by OCLC. Most of the fountains were constructed from the reign of Louis XIV to the revolution and include the Luxembourg Gardens' grotto. A very good, uncut copy in a sympathetic later binding.

To our knowledge, this is the first published contract for a public building printed in the English language. The commission was part of a more general plan to improve the public buildings in Edinburgh. The building by John Fergus and Patrick Jamieson follows the overall design of John Adam and details its costs. A folding frontispiece illustrates the building's frontal elevation. Closely trimmed; with slight edge wear. While there are several copies located by OCLC, copies in the trade are rare. We could not locate a single copy selling at auction during the past twenty-five years.

This handbook summarizes the exhibition catalogue "The Afro-American Tradition in Decorative Arts," compiled by curator, John Vlach. The exhibition was held at the Cleveland Museum of Art from February 1 to April 2, 1978, and at other museums a later dates. Many of the items from the 99 piece exhibition are illustrated and include pottery, basketry, musical instruments, wood carving, quilting, boatbuilding, blacksmithing, architecture, and graveyard decoration. Very good.

James Ferguson (1710-1776) came from a humble background to become one of the leading mechanical engineers of his day, a favorite of George III, and an expert on pneumatics, hydrostatics, optics, and astronomy. This title went through seven editions by 1790 and had a revised edition printed in America in 1803. It was also advertised in the *Virginia Gazette* and was in William and Mary's library before the Revolution as well as included in the Library of Virginia and the newly established library of the University of Virginia by Thomas Jefferson after the Revolution. Contemporary signature "J. Dugmore" on title leaf. Bound without half-title, else very good.

This is the first French edition of the first history of Kentucky. It contains the first French map of Kentucky, and was the first book to mention Daniel Boone. The French edition, translated by Parraud, contains additions not in the first American or English editions. The title was first printed in Wilmington, Delaware, the previous year. This is an exceptionally handsome copy in a full-calf binding. There is a slight waterstain to the margin along the fore-edge, not affecting text or the map, else fine. Uncommon in any early edition, finding such a desirable copy is rare.

One of the plates is folding. The plates show equipment used in the craft and samples of the work. With the contemporary bookplate of Samuel Rhodes dated 1850. Samuel was the son of the noted woolen merchant, Wright Rhodes, of Springfield Mills. Slightly rubbed.

Volume I is on Virginia "to which is added an appendix, containing the journals of the conventions in Virginia from the commencement to the present time." The second volume is on Maryland which includes in its appendix "The acts of Dr. Bray's visitation held at Annapolis in Maryland, May 23, 24, 25 anno 1700." The Reverend Francis L. Hawks was Rector of St. Thomas' Church, New York. Front cloth boards of both volumes stamped in gilt "Wellington Diocesan Library," in New Zealand. Diocesan bookplates on inside of front boards. Some moderate foxing to title pages and first few leaves of each volume, else very good.

A rare pamphlet by the eminent architect, Nicholas Hawksmoor, protege of Sir Christopher Wren. Hawksmoor proposed a new nine-arch stone bridge over the Thames at Westminster to replace the ancient and decrepit old London Bridge, with supporting data supplied by Charles Labelye on the likely effect of Hawksmoor's bridge on the Thames downstream water level. Hawksmoor also suggests that the existing mediaeval London Bridge could be adapted by inserting two wide new arches into its existing structure. His proposal, although not enacted before his death in 1736, was the impetus to eventually build the first new bridge across the Thames since Roman times. He compares finely engineered European examples in Italy and France and illustrates his proposed bridge. Labelye (who did build the new bridge after Hawksmoor's death) worked with Hawksmoor on this proposal. Plates cleaned, the first two plates also neatly repaired for old tears.

Hobbs' work is a most uncommon architectural pattern book illustrated with over 100 engravings with plans and elevations for eighty-four separate houses in widely diverse styles, many of which were originally printed in *Godey's Ladies' Book* and *The Farmer*. The remaining plans have never before appeared in print. Each listing includes a drawing of the exterior of the house, a plan, and a description in which the author recommends building materials, suggests a cost for construction, describes the style of the house and discusses the characteristics of a suitable tenant. Many of the houses are identified by owner and location. A diverse collection of Victorian cottages, villas, churches, and more. The houses are mainly in the Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, and Youngstown, Ohio, areas. Very good in dark green cloth boards with gilt title to spine and gilt illustration of a house to front board. Professionally respined using original spine as an overlay, else very good.

Early owner's signature on front blank leaves. Binding worn and stained.

Hulme's book, illustrating methods for turning designs in nature into ornamentation, was a cornerstone in the development of English Art Nouveau. His emphasis, as the title suggests, is on botanical form, particularly those of indigenous wild flowers, such as Hedge Cress, Corn Marigold, Meadow Saffron, etc. This was the only edition of the work--surprising given the importance of the work and the many editions of Hulme's other books. The handsome chromolithographic plates were exquisitely printed by Dupuy et fils, Paris. The influence of Hulme's teacher, Christopher Dresser, is apparent in many of Hulme's designs. According to Eric Holzenberg, For Art's Sake, The Aesthetic Movement in Print and Beyond, 1870-1890, this is "one of the most arresting, yet least well-known, color plate books of the Aesthetic era...the plates in his Suggestions are an entertaining riot of vivid purples, greens and yellow, often accented with gold." This work, when met with, is often falling to pieces and damaged through the Victorian use of gutta-percha as a binding medium, which then decays. With this copy, which is in excellent condition, the spine is neatly repaired, a few missing elements replaced with compatible cloth. The copy is free from foxing, which is unusual for this title.

The line drawings are a style guide to identify furniture features from Italian Renaissance to French Provincial and Georgian revival. The photographic section illustrates the different types of furniture in various styles - mainly sofas, chairs and tables. The watercolor illustrations display various styled interiors with appropriate period pieces in a unified interior. Staple-bound wrappers; some marks on cover; center page loose.

Moore, but Howes incorrectly lists the work as possibly written by Nicholas Rogers. This is the first published work by the man who wrote "Twas the Night Before Christmas." Moore wrote the pamphlet in an effort to defeat Thomas Jefferson's bid for the presidency. An attractive, uncut copy in its original state. Scarce thus. Marginal stain on last two leaves.

This is the first example of the "Relivo" style binding, patented by Remnant and Edmonds, whose binder's ticket is present in this copy. The binding was designed by Owen Jones. The covers are deeply embossed and blind-stamped, an effect created by building up portions of the board underneath and using a high-pressure steam driven press to affix the leather to the boards. This is also the first secular book designed by Jones, who used chromolithographic ornamentation to surround and enhance the text. Cover shows very light rubbing and the book itself appears to have been very professionally recased. Still, a very attractive copy of a key book in Nineteenth-Century English book making, very uncommon in the American issue.

According to the preface: "The following designs have all been selected from the pages of the *American Builder*, but it is believed that subscribers to that publication will be glad to get them in book form, printed on fine paper. As the *American Builder* has been in existence since 1868, there was, of course, a great number of illustrations to select from. We have chosen those which we deemed most suitable for a popular book of practical designs." Mild wear at extremities, else very good.

The ornamental decorations were first issued in 1785 and were made popular through the work of Clerisseau and Belanger. The first twenty plates are after Lavallee-Poussin, after his fifteen year stay in Rome. The remainder were drawn by Voisin, Le Clerc, Berthelot, de Claire, and L. Janneret. The work is complete, as issued. It also contains an introduction by Marie Alexandre Lenoir (1761-1839). The final suite of four plates by Janneret shows the designs in architectural settings, illustrating their use for interior decorating. Some skillful repairs to hinges, else a very good copy. Scarce.

Elisabeth Aslin gives it special mention in her bibliography, *Aesthetic Movement*. The nineteen color printed plates are by Thomas Crane, Walter Crane's older brother. One of these plates is reproduced in Stuart Durant's book, *Ornament*, with the comment "Crane's designs, with their muted colour schemes, are representative of the eclectic spirit of the Aesthetic Movement." The plates, characterized by the best sort of abstract flat color patterns, as in the works of Jones and Audsley, give designs for a footstool or cushions, curtains, chair-backs, table cloths, bed hangings, etc. Wear at spine and corners of binding, but a fine copy of an influential work.

Clement Moore, better known as the author of the Christmas story, *Twas the Night Before Christmas*, was a noted writer and American professor of Oriental and Greek Literature, as well as divinity and Biblical learning at the General Theological Seminary of the Protestant Episcopal Church in New York City. His Hebrew lexicon was one of his earliest contributions to the field in America, "being a lexicon and grammar of the whole language." It "contains an explanation of every word which occurs in the Psalms; with notes." He dedicated the work to his father "The Right Reverend Benjamin Moore,...as a tribute of respect and gratitude, by his affectionate son." Some early ink notations, else very good.

He was an Albanian nobleman and military commander, who first served the Ottoman Empire from 1423 to 1443, the Republic of Venice from 1443 to 1447, and lastly the Kingdom of Naples until his death in 1468. After leaving the Ottoman service, he led a rebellion against the Ottoman Empire in what is today Albania and Macedonia which kept at bay the Ottomans from regaining their authority over the region for years. With a 36-page of Appleton's book stock in back. Very good.

This is the first published work by Frederick Nash's (1782-1856), a very nice copy, complete with a separately printed publisher's prospectus. The work is a collection of nine views drawn and etched by Nash, and finished in sepia aquatints by Frederick C. Lewis and others. The illustrations show exterior and interior views of St. George's Chapel, including elevations for details, and windows in the nave, aisles, and choir. Nash was a pupil of Thomas Malton the younger before entering the Royal Academy; his works include *Twelve Views of the Antiquities of London* (1805-1810), *Picturesque Views of the City of Paris and its Environs* (1820-1823), and more. At the time of his death, Nash was considered to be the finest architectural painter of his day. Edges rubbed, some light rubbing to the marbled paper boards but generally a very good,

unsophisticated copy in its original binding. Nash's first printed work is most uncommon, OCLC cites six copies only in American libraries. It is rare in this contemporary binding and rarer still complete with the printed prospectus.

First published in 1703, Neve's dictionary was, to quote Eileen Harris, "an entirely new type of architectural book," the first architectural dictionary in England. The third edition is the first to have the engraved frontispiece of the Earl of Burlington's House in Chiswick, and contains two thousand seven hundred new articles. It was written in response to a two volume *Builder's Dictionary* published in 1734. Schimmelman recorded copies of this title at Yale, the Logan Library, the Library Company of Philadelphia, and other American locations. Copies were also advertised in Williamsburg in 1764. Technical dictionaries like this are of interest because most dictionaries, including the OED, frequently omit or ignore the use of technical terms. Contemporary ink signature on title page. Small early ink stain on frontispiece plate. Professionally rebacked, but essentially very good copy of an important and scarce book.

"Designed to be constructed in the patent cement slab system by W. H. Lascelles." Newton served his apprenticeship in the architectural offices of Richard Norman Shaw from 1873 to 1876, remaining in his offices for three more years until 1880 before commencing his own successful and prolific practice. According to Hermann Muthesius in *The English House*, (1904) "He is one of the busiest architects in England and therefore represents the good principles of current thinking about the house perhaps its most accessible form." Newton's volume is a companion volume to a book published in 1878 by Richard Norman Shaw when Newton was still in Shaw's offices. It also has designs to be constructed in the Lascelles patent cement system and contains 28 plates -- thus explaining the numbering of the plates 29 to 44 in Newton's companion volume. However, this became his life's work and was not published until after his death. A

copy is recorded in the library of Robert Carter of Nomini Hall in eighteenth-century Virginia. Sympathetically rebacked. Some minor darkening of title page and a few other leaves, else very good.

Peter Parker, responsible for the second issue, is notable as one of the publishers of Milton's Paradise Lost. Sympathetically rebacked. Scarce. no copies on OCLC in United States and only two in UK. Some staining, else very good.

Leclerc/ Abbas/ Vallis Secretae" on front pastedown. Also has later bookplate. Boards and spine show wear, especially on hinges and extremities of spine, else very good.

A rare survival and an attractive piece of commemorative advertising. A fine set, in its original display case, of six medals commemorating a visit to the International Centennial Exhibition at Philadelphia in 1876. The set was also used to advertise the Ornamental Wood Company of Philadelphia which has manufactured the medals using a newly patented process. Two of the medals have "Pat[ented] June 1, 1875" stamped beneath the portraits. These medals could be purchased separately or as a set in a fitted case in three different sizes. The Ornamental Wood Company exhibited in the Machinery Hall where visitors bought these medals as souvenirs.

The hexagon shaped box containing tray of blue cardboard with six holes, rimmed in gold, holding the six medals, the lid with a fine lithographed "Birds Eye View of the International Exhibition Buildings" (published by Breuker and Cassler, Philadelphia). The six die-pressed wood medals have a diameter of 2 3/4 inches (for four of them) and 3 1/3 inches (for two of them). The medals are extremely fine, the two larger ones show on the obverse the Memorial Hall and the Main Building while the smaller ones depict Independence Hall and portraits of George Washington, General Joseph Hawley (President of the Centennial Exhibition) and Alfred Goshorn (Director General and chief organizer of the Centennial Exhibition). All medals are rendered in high relief on the obverse, while the reverse has around "The 100th Anniversary of the American Independence, 1876" with "Great International Exhibition Fairmont Park, Philadelphia 4th of July" in the field. In excellent condition, the lithograph a little browned, the box outside in plain dark green card board, a few nicks but essentially sound.

Scarce early series of French furniture designs mainly of beds and bed hangings. Only four copies are listed on OCLC in American libraries. Pineau was acknowledged by his contemporaries as the most influential Parisian designer of rococo interiors and furnishings in the 1730s and 1740s. "Together with the architect Jean-Baptiste Leroux and the painter Francois Boucher, he transformed the Hotel de Mazarin from an unpretentious home to 'a mansion famed above all for its interior decoration'" (*The Rococo Interior,* Katie Smith). Pineau developed a distinctive style eliminating straight lines in favor of graceful curves, often with some deliberate asymmetry in the placing of decorative features. Although a large collection of his drawings is preserved in the Musee des Arts Decoratifs, Paris, only a small selection of his designs were engraved for publication during his lifetime. Slight wear at extremities of spine; upper inner hinge splitting; plates lightly browned with tiny tear at fore edge of first page, else very good.

First published in 1733 under the title, *A Treatise on Carpentry*, Elizabeth Harris identifies this as the first comprehensive work on carpentry in English. Helen Park found more copies in eighteenth century America (twenty-seven) than of any other single architectural title. George Washington owned a copy (the 1768 edition). Slight chipping to head of spine else very good.

This book has the distinction of being the first printed work by Matthew Prior and a good example of the pamphlet wars between the advocates and anti-papal forces at work in England. Written as a joint effort with Charles Montagu, first Earl of Halifax, it takes Dryden's famous beast allegory and transformed it into a tale of "The Country Mouse and the City-Mouse." This copy has extensive marginal references locating the relevant lines in Dryden's verse that the present authors are satirizing. The foot of the final leaf has been re-margined, not affecting text. The later binding is plain but handsome, reminiscent of the period, else a very good copy. While there are many copies listed in OCLC, the first edition of the book is scarce in commerce.

There is also a chapter on stone masonry, not surprisingly as Rawlins, who spent his life in Norwich, was more a successful mason and sculptor than an architect. Schimmelman locates copies in America before 1800. A four-page catalogue for J. Taylor's Architectural Library is bound-in. Sympathetically rebacked; light sporadic foxing; else

The frontispiece shows a view of the New York House of Refuge, while the five full-sized interior plates show such scenes as the boys at work in the brass nail shop, the boys at dinner, and the boys at play on the Refuge playground, the Refuge Sunday-school, and the chapel service. Also includes a cut of the punch and press machinery used to make the nails. Boards rubbed, else very good.

This is a rare example of his literary works, which was dedicated to William Wyndham, his patron who was Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. However, even though this is a collection of his poetry with numerous colored aquatint plates mostly of interiors, two of the plates display romantic natural scenes which parallel his landscape commissions in England. Boards detached, else very good.

Previous owner's signature. Very good.

This is one of a few American building books to be reprinted in the British Isles. It was

first printed in America under the title, *The Practical Carpenter and Joiner* [Hitchcock, 1007]. It is a Model Book, with plates 54 through 57 in duplicate and mounted on cardboard so that the figures could be cut and folded into three dimensional models. The tinted frontispiece shows nine views of carpenters at work. Properly using the book destroyed it, so complete copies are most uncommon. Very good.

One of Thomas Rowlandson's most popular series of engraved plates illustrating William Combe's most popular set of books. He was a "prolific English writer of miscellaneous prose and satirical verse." Dr. Syntax was introduced in 1809 in *The Poetical Magazine*. Combe's first Dr. Syntax book, *The Tour of Dr. Syntax in Search of the Picturesque* (1812) and its sucessors, *The Second Tour of Dr. Syntax in Search of Consolation* (1820), and *The Third Tour of Dr. Syntax in Search of a Wife* (1821), satirize the many eighteenth-century and early nineteenth-century writers whose "Tours," "Travels," and "Journeys" were vehicles for sententious moralizing, uninspired raptures, and sentimental accounts of amorous adventures. The popularity of Combe's work owed much to the illustrations of Thomas Rowlandson whose engravings were for late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries in England what William Hogarth was to the earlier eighteenth-century. The binding is a fine example by Bumpus, Oxford Street, London a contemporary and peer to Reviere & Son.

His best known works illustrated many of Charles Dickens novels and contributed to the success of the novels. These humorous plates follow in Seymour's style satirizing the Cockney lifestyle. "A complete collection of one hundred and eighty humorous designs. With some account of the artist and his work." Minor edge wear to covers, else very good.

Scarce early account of Thames River pollution and sole edition of a work on private property. In colonial Virginia, both George Washington and Richard Henry Lee owned copies. The text is mostly a criticism of Robert Adam's proposed Adelphi project on the Thames. A legal attack on the architect Robert Adam and his brothers, although not by name, and their plan to create an embankment on the Thames for the purpose of building the Adelphi. In 1768 Robert Adam "and his three brothers leased the ground fronting the Thames, upon which the Adelphi now stands...and having obtained, with the assistance of Lord Bute, the needful act of Parliament, proceeded, in the teeth of public opposition, to erect the ambitious block of buildings which is imperishably associated with their name..." With a six page "Index to the Maxims of Common Law, and other Authorities quoted in this book." Sharp did not finish these two tracts before the Legislature had passed the bill authorizing the embankment, but he published them anyway "as they particularly relate to the Rights and Property of the City of London." Paper slightly browned else very good.

Thomas Moule wrote the text, and Shaw illustrates Elizabethan exterior and interior details, inlaid paneling, carved friezes, chimney-pieces, stairways, ceilings, and more. These are taken from Longleat, Haddon Hall, Gilling Castle, Branshill House, Hatfield, and other buildings. Several elevations are shown to give "the general character of the facade." The measured and architectural drawings include three color plates. Light sporadic foxing. Bookplate. Respined, else a very good copy.

Gilt decorated spine and bands on boards as well as original marbled end papers. Very good.

Early Virginia libraries to have copies include John Mercer's and Joseph Prentis' (Williamsburg). Rebacked, else very good.

The first agricultural association in the state of New York was the "Society for the Promotion of Agriculture, Arts and Manufactures," organized in New York City in 1791. It was succeeded by this society in 1804, and this is the first volume of their transactions. Butter, butter churns, protractors, cleaning casks, weights and measures, manure, the introduction of Spanish sheep, cultivation of hemp, Indian corn, smut in wheat, disease in flax, culture of the grape, etc. with handsome plates. Here are a number of contributions by Chancellor Robert R. Livingston, several on merino sheep (with a folding plate), as well as a description and plate of "A Floating Battery, on a new construction, by the late Abraham Bloodgood." The rotating battery involved substantially the principal that would be used in the turret in Erickson's Civil War *Monitor.* Ownership signature "Cuyler Reynolds, Member, Albany." Reynolds (1866-1934) was a journalist, author, historian, and antiquarian librarian. He was the first curator of the Albany Institute of Art. Lewis began selling homes in 1913 and sold 60,000 over the course of the 60 year history. The thirty moderately sized and priced house designs -- from one to two story -- include a floor plan, most with a colorful illustration with description. Included are illustrated sections in interior design, construction details and the quality of the companies product line along with order forms. Loosely inserted in are two price lists which include freight charges to deliver each house. Very good.

Rare item with only one copy recorded on OCLC - Ohio State Connection. The McClure Company began as a lumber and logging business and later developed into a construction business. Their architectural service offered construction of high quality, attractive homes. This portfolio shows their line of homes in an elegant manner. The eight-page booklet gives specification and details with illustration that are available in their designs. Each of the 24 photographic cards of the house designs has plan number, floor plans and description of the house. Very good.

Some chapters include: "Romance of glass"; "Making of plate glass"; "Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company today"; "Modern store fronts"; "Plate glass and furniture"; "Interior shop display"; and "Glazing of store fronts." There are many printed charts (fifteen pages) of available colors for various usages in the chapter "The use of color." These include interior and exterior gloss, semi-gloss and flat paints, as well as varnishes, stains, and industrial use paints. Very good.

designs submitted in the Architectural Competition conducted by the T-Square Club and the Portland Cement Association. It features semi-detached and duplex homes mainly in New York and Philadelphia. Each design gives the name of the architect, an exterior rendering, floor plans with measurements, and in many cases, details. Inserted is a cover letter on Portland Cement Association stationary letterhead about this catalogue and what it offers, dated May 29, 1929. Printed in margin of cover, "A.I.A. File 10 a 2." Very good.

The catalogue is rare with no copies appearing in OCLC or any other standard reference. While this is identified as Book I, we could find no evidence that other parts were ever published. Even if there were, this work stands as complete, in itself. A very good copy in the publisher's printed yellow wrappers.

Scarce trade catalogue. OCLC records only two copies of this second revised edition - Columbia University and the National Agricultural Library; and one copy of the 1900 third edition at Harvard. There are no copies of the first edition listed. Forty-three homes, churches, public buildings and businesses (mostly in the region around Boston: Brookline, Dorchester, Cambridge, etc.) illustrated with photographs of the variety of styles especially Arts & Crafts, Romanesque, early Colonial Revival and Queen Anne, many with the owners and architects names. Contents include sections on the uses and characteristics of cypress, cypress doors, cypress sash, cypress clapboards, cypress shingles, cypress fences, information on painting and staining cypress, etc. With architectural profile drawings of cypress gutters in back. Very good.

Oelsnitz in Vogtland: (1930). Oblong folio. Original blind embossed gold-colored pebbled cloth spine and lower board, with specially woven (knotted?) carpet-like upper board, bound album style with gold cord. (68) pages, of which 8 pages text (with some figures) and the remainder plates (the majority in color).

A rare carpet trade catalogue not recorded on OCLC. A beautifully produced album by one of Germany's leading carpet manufacturing companies, then celebrating its Golden Jubilee. The upper board is covered in a specially woven pile "rug" which, according to the text, was made to a quality of 720,000 knots/sq. meter. The design is the corner of one of their carpets into which has been woven 1880-1930 and the firm's "logo" (a crescent moon surrounding a five-point star, with the capital letters K facing both ways

between the horns of the moon). Koch & te Kock was established in 1880 producing Axminster-style carpets and rugs, initially mainly for the domestic market though in the years following the end of W W.I, a useful export business was established. Koch & te Kock became the largest carpet manufacturer in Germany, and Oelsnitz in Vogtland became known as the "carpet city." Production fell into 22 standard qualities, with a total of 500 designs (a great number based on Oriental carpets) made in 60 different basic sizes. Their preferred wool was that of Scottish black-faced sheep. The text shows various stages in production, followed by a series of interiors showing rugs *in situ*, with floor plans of the rooms facing, showing the placement of the rugs within the rooms. Very good.

The three catalogues list all sorts of rugs produced: Teheran, Kairo, Uschak, Hamdur durchgewebt, Mohair-Angora, Korassan, Bombay, Sparta, Afgan, Kirman, Masched, Mohair-Emir, Mudjur, Mainz-Velour. The company is described as "alleinge Herstellerin die rest und alteste Oelsnitzer Asminster-Teppish-Fabrik" (the sole manufacturer and the first and oldest Oelsnitzer Axminster carpet factory).

Lewis F. Garlinghouse was one of the early publishers of plan books which he used to "jumpstart" his construction business in 1907. Iva Lieurance, one of the earliest and most success woman architects in the first half of the 20th century, was a major contributor of house designs for his successful company. She started with Garlinghouse from its beginning in 1907 and worked until the 1950s. The apogee of her career was in the 1940s and 1950s when the returning soldiers and sailors from World War II needed homes in the booming post-war economy. This volume has an extensive collection of her home plans, designed in a variety of different materials and styles for post World War II families. Each of the 142 house designs, "many of them never before published," has an exterior view, with sixteen in color, a floor plan, dimensions, description and price to order plans. Good.

A scarce Virginia piece. OCLC only records four copies in American libraries with only three in Virginia - Library of Virginia, Lynchburg Public Library, and the University of Virginia. A souvenir program sponsored by the APVA for a production of Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream." The program is filled with numerous local Virginia business advertisements primarily in Richmond. Interspersed are photographs of scenes and actors from the production, along with portraits of the APVA committee members overseeing the production as well as photographs of important historic buildings in Virginia associated with the APVA - the "Old Powder Horn" in Williamsburg, the old church tower at Jamestown. Other photographs include sites in Richmond - the Capitol Building, the City Hall Building, and Murphy's Hotel with advertisement. A brief history on the founding of the A.P.V.A. is interspersed through the advertisements followed by a summation of the play and roster of the actors in the play. Other advertisers include Thalheimer's Bros., The Valentine Museum; Daughters of the Confederacy, State Bank of Virginia, as well as the Colonial Inn in Williamsburg. Edges chipped; wrappers worn with front cover detached.

The first German printing of Vitruvius was edited by Walter Hermann Ryff, a Strassbourg physician, mineralogist and mathematician. The majority of the ninety-one woodcut illustrations are based on Cesariano's Como edition of 1521. A few others are copied from Giocondo's edition as well as the fourth book of Serlio. Ryff later translated Vitruvius into German. Neatly rebacked, some light waterstaining to the area around the lower tip of some pages; edges and tips of boards chipped, still a very good copy of an important early edition of Vitruvius.

Waagen returned to England in 1850, under the patronage of Sir Charles and Lady Eastlake, to continue his study of the great collections of art in the English country homes. This work was the result. He had compiled so much new material above and

beyond what was published in his first work in 1838, that this entirely new publication resulted. Lady Eastlake took the lead in having it translated and published in England by John Murray in London. Although more comprehensive and complete in its recording and observations on the works of art than his first work, this title was considered less readable. Lady Eastlake smoothed out some of Dr. Waagen's originality in writing and changed the focus from the great masters and their works (of Dr. Waagen's intent) to the new fashion in artistic circles of focusing on the living artists. Nevertheless, Waagen's work is still considered a major study of these primary collections and the most complete record of their holdings. It complements his first work. The fourth and final volume of the set changes the focus and has an entirely new title page: "Galleries and Cabinets of Art in Great Britain: being an account of more than forty collections of Paintings, Drawings, Sculptures, Mss,. &, &. Gilt calf spines with marbled end pages. Very good.

With half-titles and 166 engraved plates as called for; some plates lightly spotted; two plates in the final volume supplied from another set; lacks the three pages of directions to the binder at the end of Volume V (rarely present), but an excellent set of the first issue, with the titles watermarked 1797. Tilden" possibly by the author? Could this be the same A[lphonzo] F. Tilden who was manager of the Esmeralda Silver & Copper Mining Corporation in Arizona, 1864-1865? Nearly fine.

Slight shelf wear, else very good.

First edition, copy no. 71 of 90, signed in the colophon by both Winslow and Wright. "Printed by hand at the Augergne Press in during the winter months of the year eighteen hundred ninety six and seven." Though Wright did not write the text (and they spelled Gannett's name wrong on the title page) this really has to be considered his first book as the page decorations were entirely designed by him; in addition, the volume incorporates a booklet sewn to the front end paper which contains a series of twelve hand printed collotypes of dried weeds from photographs made by Wright. Wright himself considered it his first book and said so in a letter to Samuel R. Morrill, the Boston bookseller. It is a famous book, both in the history of Frank Lloyd Wright and as an outstanding American press book. See D. Hanks, The Decorative Designs of Frank Lloyd Wright, pp. 172-176 where he points out that the series of Apollonian figures holding the blocks on the title page prefigure those of the female sprites at Midway Gardens (1914) where the block was held with both hands above the head. Thus the book decorations play a part in the evolution of Wright as an architect and designer.

The book has a Wright family association. Written on the front pastedown is the following: "Hillside Farm/ Main Library/ Deep Shelves 2/720." Wright's aunts, Nell and

Jane Flloyd Jones founded a progressive school in Hillside, WI; in 1887 the aunts asked their nephew to design a school building for them. This building was Wright's first built work. Neatly rebacked; edges of covers are lightly worn but a good clean and fresh copy of a fragile and rare book.

First published in 1725, it was popular in America, and recorded in several early Virginia libraries including the libraries of Dr. Nicholas Flood (1775) in Westmoreland County and the also by William Beverley of Blandfield Plantation in Essex County. It was regularly advertised in the *Virginia Gazette* up to the eve of the Revolution with several copies sold in the *Virginia Gazette* daybooks as well. It is a thoroughly comprehensive study of surveying methods for all terrains and includes the placement of buildings. The fold-out frontispiece plate illustrates surveying equipment. Extremities of spine chipped; hinges cracked but firm, else very good.

Elements of aesthetic design are seen throughout. Previous owners name in ink on front blank leaf, "John McLachlan, Architect/ 2 Queen St. Edn.," a noted Edinburgh architect in the late nineteenth century. Nicely rebacked, else very good.
